INTRODUCING: SYMPHONY NO. 3 ALTERED LANDSCAPE BY JIMMY LÓPEZ BELLIDO

The best art is both timely and timeless. It inspires, provokes, comforts and catalyzes. Acclaimed composer Jimmy López Bellido's new work "Symphony No. 3: Altered Landscape" checks all of these boxes. Commissioned by the Reno Phil, the work is informed and inspired by the Nevada Museum of Art's "Altered Landscape, Carol Franc Buck Collection" of photography, the work engages themes of humanity's accelerated consumption of the Earth's resources, the pandemic-imposed pause we have withstood, and the quest for a future of harmony and sustainable balance on Earth. This organic and substantial partnership between two of Nevada's flagship arts organizations is a model of authentic collaboration.

The composer's own words best describe the fourth movement, "Alignment." López Bellido says about it: "'Alignment' brings back musical elements from all prior movements, but unlike its predecessors, it is luminous in character and filled with hope. It envisions a world in which we humans have finally reached a level of maturity and awareness that allows us to continue our scientific advances and technological development without damaging the planet that gave us birth. It is filled with the promise of human ingenuity, pointing toward a future where we have finally mastered the balancing act between our individual desires for a better and more comfortable life, and the greater good of our fellow human beings and our planet. Idealistic? Without a doubt. Impossible? Only we, collectively, hold the answer to that question."

Led by music director Laura Jackson, the Reno Phil presents the world premiere of the work on May 7 and 8, 2022, and around this time the Nevada Museum of Art will exhibit photographs from the "Altered Landscape Collection" that spurred the composition. The entire project is intended to inspire audiences, build awareness and act as a catalyst for important conversations between diverse groups and industries about how we humans utilize, deploy and steward our planet's finite resources.

Because of the importance of the subject matter, the prominence of the composer and the quality of the piece, the Reno Phil is building a consortium of orchestras around the globe that will perform the work and convene the important conversations around it. Thanks to exceedingly generous contributions, the commission is fully funded. This allows the Phil to deploy an unprecedented pay-it-forward model for participating groups.

I mentioned earlier the authentic collaboration between the Reno Phil and Nevada Museum of Art, but there is a third crucial partner. Consortium orchestras will not be charged to play the piece, but they will be asked to take tangible action against climate change by making a contribution to The Nature Conservancy, a global nonprofit working to create a world where people and nature can thrive. The Reno Phil made the first such donation at an event on Sept. 29 at the McCarran Ranch Preserve, on the Truckee River east of Reno.

BACK TO SCHOOL

In August over 300 students returned to live music education in the Reno Phil's many youth programs!

First, the four Reno Phil Youth Orchestras met for their annual retreats; intensive sessions of rehearsals, sectionals, and additional musical enrichment. The four RPYO ensembles feature all orchestral instruments and cover all ability levels from introductory to pre-professional. They rehearse weekly, working towards their Fall Showcase Concert on November 29th at the Pioneer Center for the Performing Arts.

A week after the RPYO ensembles kicked off, Reno Phil Association Kids (RPAK) students also began to meet after school for music classes. The RPAK program is offered at Bernice Mathews, Lincoln Park, and Stead Elementary schools three days a week and includes both music theory and violin classes taught by trained Reno Phil staff. The Reno Phil provides all the materials, including instruments and music, free of charge to the students, with the goal of reaching populations that would not normally have access to music lessons. The students have quarterly recitals at their respective schools where they show what they have learned throughout the year.

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
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PRIVATE LESSONS

Everything about the program has expanded from the pilot season last year! We've added teachers, instruments, and students, and we've refined the application process to better find the students who can most benefit from this program. The students this year come from all corners of Reno, and the recommendation letters from teachers reinforce the importance of this program. In recommending an 8th grader on bassoon, one teacher wrote, "She loves to practice and can be found most days after school in the practice room. When starting a student on bassoon, you should choose a bright, talented, and dedicated musician who can take lessons.
